Notice of MelNet AGM - 2 November 2018

The MelNet AGM will be held at the Cordis Hotel, Auckland from 5.15 – 5.45pm on Friday 2 November 2018, in conjunction with the 2018 New Zealand Melanoma Summit.

Members are invited to submit nominations for the Executive Committee in writing to the MelNet Coordinator no later than **5.00 pm Friday 19 October 2018**. These should include the nominee's name, a brief biography and the signatures of two members.

According to MelNet rules, the Committee shall comprise at least eight and no more than ten members, with occupations that span the continuum. Members who will be serving the second year of their two-year term are a health promoter, a plastic surgeon, a surgical oncologist and a plastic surgeon/senior lecturer. Up to six additional members can be elected to the committee at the AGM. Preference will be given to those with oncology, GP, nursing, dermatology, pathology and research expertise.

Members are also invited to submit any remits or other matters to be considered at the AGM to the <u>MelNet Coordinator</u> no later than **5.00pm Friday 19 October 2018**.

Skin cancer science: Sunscreen in winter urged as study reveals flaws in UV advice Radio New Zealand

Health agencies in Australia and New Zealand recommend people use sun protection when the UV index (UVI) is three or higher. However, a world-first Australasian study co-authored by NIWA Emeritus Scientist, Dr Richard McKenzie, has found that people can get sunburned on days when the UV index is under three, especially if they're fair-skinned and spending a lot of time outside. The study recommends that New Zealanders use sunscreen even on the shortest, darkest day in winter to prevent skin damage and cancer.
