New Australian online tool to predict future risk of developing melanoma

Scientists from QIMR Berghofer Medical Research Institute in Australia have developed an online test to help people aged 40 and over to predict their risk of developing melanoma over the next 3.5 years. The risk predictor was developed using data from nearly 42,000 Queenslanders aged from their forties to seventies. It calculates the results based on seven risk factors for melanoma.
