A snapshot of MelNet's year | Celebrating our achievements

- Our membership grew to over 1300.
- We held two meetings of the Melanoma Research and Therapy Special Interest Group.
- We coordinated two one-day Skin Lesion and Dermatoscopy courses. Thank you to Adjunct Associate Professor Amanda Oakley for conducting these courses.
- In collaboration with Cancer Nurse Coordinators, we organised a Skin Cancer Study Day for over 100 nurses in the Auckland region.
- Many MelNet members have been heavily involved in updating the Standards of Service Provision for Patients with Melanoma in New Zealand Provisional.
- We have made submissions recommending:
 - Standards NZ retain AS/NZS 2635:2008 Solaria for cosmetic purposes (in partnership with Melanoma New Zealand)
 - \circ $\;$ sunscreen be included in the Therapeutic Products Regulatory Scheme
 - strengthening actions in the New Zealand Cancer Action Plan that support skin cancer prevention and early detection (in partnership with Melanoma New Zealand).

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Skin Lesions and Dermatoscopy course

Conducted by Adjunct Associate Professor Amanda Oakley, this one-day course addresses clinical and dermatoscopic diagnosis of common benign and malignant skin lesions, particularly pigmented lesions. All health professionals undertaking skin examinations are invited to attend.

The course is co-hosted by MelNet and the Goodfellow Symposium and offered as a pre-symposium workshop. It has been endorsed by The Royal New Zealand College of General Practitioners and has been approved for up to 6.0 credits CME for General Practice Educational Programme Stage 2 (GPEP2) and Maintenance of Professional Standards (MOPS) purposes.
