Members are invited to submit nominations for the Executive Committee in writing to the MelNet CEO no later than 5.00 pm Friday 25 October 2019 . These should include the nominee's name, a brief biography and the signatures of two members.

According to the MelNet rules, the Committee shall comprise at least eight and no more than ten members, with occupations that span the continuum. Members who will be serving the second year of their two-year term are a GP, nurse, dermatologist and pathologist. Up to six additional members can be elected to the committee at the AGM. Preference will be given to those with health promotion, oncology, research and surgical expertise.

# PHARMAC to amend Special Authority criteria for PD-1 inhibitor re-treatment for melanoma patients

PHARMAC are looking to amend the Special Authority criteria for pembrolizumab and nivolumab for advanced melanoma to allow patients who have stopped treatment for reasons other than disease progression or toxicity to recommence funded treatment upon signs of disease progression.

Under the current Special Authority criteria patients with signs of disease progression would not be eligible for ongoing funded treatment as they would not meet the current renewal criteria which require no signs of disease progression, whether treatment was continuous or not.

As amendment to the Pharmaceutical Schedule will take time to implement and public consultation is required, an interim approval pathway has been put in place.

Clinicians need to manually complete the relevant Special Authority form indicating clearly which criteria are and are not met, noting that the reason for the waiver application is for retreatment. Type of previous response, length of previous treatment, length of treatment holiday should also be noted.
