Worth a read: Health Promotion Agency's research "SunSmart behaviours for outdoor socialisers"

The Health Promotion Agency has undertaken qualitative research into attitudes, awareness, and concern toward UVR and SunSmart behaviours of outdoor socialisers aged 18-24 years.

Findings identified:

- A high awareness of SunSmart behaviours, however this does not always translate into using SunSmart behaviours.
- Decision making is driven by short-term considerations such as choosing to tan or look good.
- Knowledge of UV risk and behaviours to reduce UV exposure is not sufficient motivation to adopt these behaviours or use UVR information to help inform SunSmart behaviours.
