### Skin cancer prevention in Aotearoa New Zealand | Recent publications by Dr Bronwen McNoe

MelNet's new Executive Committee member Dr Bronwen McNoe has recently published an interesting paper about the need for improvement in skin cancer control in New Zealand. '<u>Prevention is better than a cure: we can</u> do better in skin cancer control in New Zealand!' outlines a set of recommendations to help reduce UVR exposure in New Zealand.

Bronwen is also the co-author of another recent paper. '<u>Generating political priority for skin cancer primary</u> <u>prevention: A case study from Aotearoa New Zealand</u>' describes strategies that could help raise the political profile for skin cancer prevention in New Zealand.

Furthermore, Bronwen has issued a <u>call to action</u> to all New Zealanders to step up and take sun safety seriously.
